Standards Focus: Understanding Symbolism

In literature, a symbol is a concrete image used to represent a larger concept or a deeper meaning. Instead of being confined to a precise definition, they offer room for interpretation and have the ability to relate to ideas outside of the novel. Before discussing the symbols present in *The Catcher in the Rye* use the worksheet below to better understand how symbols work.

In order for symbols to accomplish the objectives of the author they must first be like, or closely related to, the thing they depict. Thus, the object must have built-in characteristics that will work with the ideas the author wants to express. For example, the skull and crossbones has been used as a symbol for poison because they represent remnants of a dead body. Bones, then, are taken to symbolize death.
